Juniors:

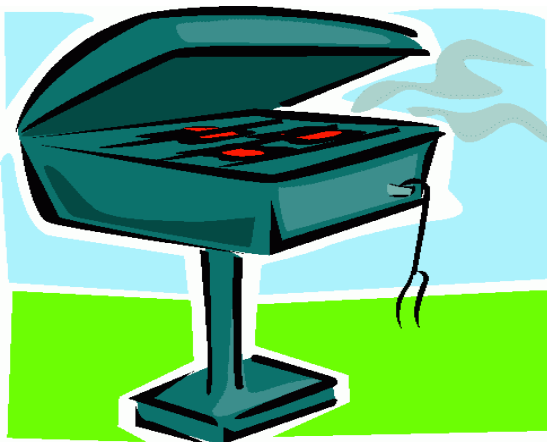

Jewelry Tips of the Month

TOOTHPICKS

The round, stronger toothpicks have a multitude of uses on the jewelry bench. I use them for mixing epoxy resin, for applying paste solder, with Zam for polishing in tight spots, and with a bit of beeswax for picking up and positioning small stones. They're particularly good for testing the fit of a small faceted stone in a prong or tube set finding.

PUMICE WHEELS

Pumice wheels are good for touching up a bezel after you've set the stone. The hardness is about 6 on the Moh's scale, less hard than quartz, so it shouldn't scratch any of your jaspers. However, I'd avoid or be real careful of using pumice near the softer stones like turquoise, amber, howelite, etc. If you're unsure that a wheel is pumice, test it with a piece of glass. Glass is about 5 ½ on the Mohs scale. If it doesn't scratch glass, it shouldn't scratch quartz.

MAGNETIC PIN FINISHER

The person reporting this on the YahooGroups Jewelry Casting list says he's made two units from these plans and they work very well. In addition to the primary job of burnishing and polishing finished pieces, he also uses the units for cleaning investment from castings.

The stainless steel pins are available from either Gesswein or Rio Grande.

June Field Trip to Toutle

"Greetings from the Field" On this field trip, John Hubbard was the Leader, we had 6 members and one guest, looking for the colorful Toutle carnelian agates and jaspers. We met at 9:00 on exit 63, the highway 505 beginning from I-5 and caravanned to the Toutle parking area.

It was a short hike to the first dig site, about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile on a gentle incline. When arriving at the site, it was apparent there were previous diggers and boy did they tear it up. Fox holes were everywhere, about 2-4 feet deep, along with a 50' live green fir under rooted and fallen. Folks, this is not good! The disrespect of other property owners is what spoils it for the rest. We all must follow the Rock Hound Code-of-Ethics if we want the collection sites to remain open, either private or public property, it just doesn't matter! Nobody had brought a camera, and I certainly forgot mine, didn't get any pictures.

We dug and everyone collected some nice carnelians. These carnelians are different here than other sites. The majority have an outer butterscotch skin that penetrates about an eighth of an inch until you hit the clear agate. The youngest guest brought out the best piece, a nice 5" X 3" deep red agate, wish I had a picture to show of it.

After about 3 hours, it was time to hit another spot about 200 yards across the gully. John Hubbard had collected a 5 gallon bucket of about 50 pounds carnelian, and decided to haul it back to the truck before proceeding to the next dig site. The rest of us FILLED in our holes and headed for the gray-blue-white material.

The digging at this site was a lot easier. You simply scratched the ground with a 3-prong rake, not more than 10" and the material pops out as you scratch. Probing multiple times doesn't take long to hit a target, usually within 5 minutes, it's time to dig the ting! The material at this spot didn't travel anywhere, it has an outer skin that is rough and sharp. All-in-All, John out did us again. He probably collected enough material that combining the rest of our together would equal what he found.

Here is a picture of the material Dean Norman found, weighed in at 55 pounds.

Rockhound Code of Ethics

I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations and rules governing collecting on private lands and will observe them.

I will to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting materials in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind, such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning materials - matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.

I will cause no damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will support the Rockhound Project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with Field Trip Leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

I will report to my Club or Federation Officers, Bureau of Land Management, or other proper authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other material on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations and for public educational and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of Natural Resources.

I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.

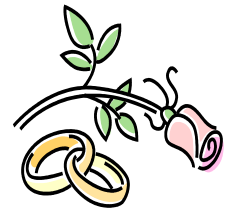

WHO NEEDS TUMBLED ROCKS??

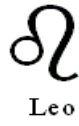
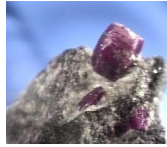

July Birthstone: Ruby/ Carnelian-Cancer (June 22 - July 22)



August Birthstone: Peridot/Sardonyx -Leo(July 23-Aug 21)



The Cancerian character is the least clear-cut of all those associated with the signs of the zodiac. It can range from the timid, dull, shy and withdrawn to the most brilliant, and famous Cancerians are to be found through the whole range of human activity. It is a fundamentally conservative and home-loving nature, appreciating the nest like quality of a secure base to which the male can retire when he needs a respite from the stresses of life, and in which the Cancerian woman can exercise her strong maternal instincts. The latter tends to like and to have a large family. 'Nest like' is an appropriate adjective for the Cancerian home, for its inhabitants tend to favor the dark, mysterious but comfortable type of house which has something of the air of a den about it, a place which belongs to the family rather than existing as a showcase to impress visitors. **Via astrology-online.com**

The gemstone **ruby** is the red variety of the mineral Corundum, the second hardest natural mineral known to mankind. Ruby is the July birthstone, and the Capricorn Zodiac stone. Ruby has been associated with the values of love, success, integrity, passion, and promise.

All colors of corundum other than red or white are called Sapphire. The red color in ruby is caused by trace amounts of the element chromium. The best shade of red for ruby is often given the name "pigeon blood red", but ruby can be any shade of red up to almost pink.

Carnelian (sometimes spelled "cornelian") is an orange variety of chalcedony, whose color can vary from nearly yellow to nearly red. If the color is darker (appearing brownish), it would be called Sard. The color of both is due to iron oxide impurities.

Carnelian is always somewhat translucent; sard may appear opaque.

Carnelian is the traditional birthstone for July, and the Zodiac birthstone for Virgo. It is associated with luck and safety. **Via Firemountaingems.com**

The Leo type is the most dominant, spontaneously creative and extrovert of all the zodiacal characters. In grandeur of manner, splendor of bearing and magnanimity of personality, they are the monarch's among humans as the lion is king of beasts. They are ambitious, courageous, dominant, strong willed, positive, independent, self-confident there is no such a word as doubt in their vocabularies, and they are self-controlled. Born leaders, either in support of, or in revolt against, the status quo. They are at their most effective when in a position of command, their personal magnetism and innate courtesy of mind bringing out the best of loyalty from subordinates. **Via astrology-online.com**

Peridot (pronounced pair-a-doe) is the gem variety of olivine. Peridot is the birthstone for August and the Zodiac stone for the constellation Libra (astrological sources refer to peridot as Chrysolite). Peridot is associated with the values of fame, dignity, protection, and success.

Olivine, which is actually not an official mineral, is composed of two minerals: fayalite and forsterite. Fayalite is the iron rich member and forsterite is the magnesium rich member. Olivine's formula is written as $(\text{Mg}, \text{Fe})_2\text{SiO}_4$ to show the substitution of the magnesium and iron. Peridot is usually closer to forsterite than fayalite in composition although iron is the coloring agent for peridot. The best colored peridot has an iron percentage of less than 15% and includes nickel and chromium as trace elements that may also contribute to the best peridot color.

Sardonyx is a banded variety of chalcedony (cryptocrystalline quartz), with layers alternating between Sard and Onyx. It is an impure fine-grained quartz whose crystals are too small to see. The color is usually a yellow-brown alternating with white, but other variants are also called sardonyx. Sardonyx is the traditional birthstone for August. It is associated with relaxation and security.
